- We need to be fighting for sustainable systems and regulations that respect seed saving, biodiversity and the right to grow one's own food without chemicals or pollutants.

A gift in a Will is always a positive step for an organic future. They are given by people of foresight to help achieve something they are passionate about. Such a gift to Garden Organic is a sign of believing in an organic, sustainable future for our loved ones and our planet.

Your legacy gift could help us in one of many ways. Here are just a few examples:

Support people through our social and therapeutic growing projects.

Our social and therapeutic growing projects deliver profound, life-changing benefits to vulnerable adults and children, such as those with physical and mental illnesses, or learning or behavioural difficulties.

A gift of **£5,000** would enable us to provide the equivalent of one day of social and therapeutic horticulture per week for a year for at least 36 young people with special educational needs.

Protect heritage varieties.

Who knows what important elements the 800+ varieties in our Heritage Seed Library may have for future generations? The biodiversity of our collection has not been explored at all. Major work over several years would be required, but investigating every variety would require significant investment. And within the day to day management of this unique collection, we have a continuing need to replace equipment and resources.

£1,500 would help us test and evaluate 15 vegetable varieties for possible inclusion in the Heritage Seed Library collection, safeguarding these for future generations. £30,000 would provide up to date equipment in the library and outside in the growing areas.

Develop or renew our demonstration gardens.

Ryton Organic Gardens, initially developed by our founder Lawrence Hills, is a continually evolving space designed to educate and inspire growers keen to do things 'the organic way'. As with all gardens, it requires continuous care and hard work.

£2,000 would enable us to refresh the planting in a designated area, £20,000 would allow us to completely redevelop an area as a lasting tribute.

Leaving a gift to Garden Organic

There are several ways in which you can leave a lasting gift to Garden Organic. If you do not already have a Will, we would recommend contacting a solicitor for advice and to ensure what you do is legally binding. If you already have a Will and you would like to add a gift to Garden Organic, a simple way to change it is to ask your solicitor to prepare what is known as a Codicil. You will also need to decide what type of gift you would like to make, and how you want it to benefit the organisation – for our general work or for a particular part of it. If you would like to leave a bequest to Garden Organic, please take this page to your solicitor so they use the correct wording:

- Pecuniary gift (fixed amount) to Garden Organic
- "I give the sum of pounds, free of all tax, to Garden Organic (working name of the Henry Doubleday Research Association) of Wolston Lane, Coventry CV8 3LG, registered charity number 298104. I direct that the receipt of the Chief Executive of the Association shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors."
- Residuary gift (part of what's left after all specific gifts) to Garden Organic
- "I give to Garden Organic (working name of the Henry Doubleday Research Association) of Ryton Organic Gardens, Wolston Lane, Coventry CV8 3LG, registered charity number 298104, a share of my residuary estate for the general purposes of the Association. I direct that the receipt of the Chief Executive of the Association shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors."
- Specific gift (for example a property or painting)
